

On Nov. 5, at least 11 people were left dead, many others injured or in critical condition during the live performance by Travis Scott at a music festival "Astroworld Festival". The event took place in Houston, Texas and was planned to be a three-day event. The incident occurred the first night of the event. Many testimonials are being broadcasted on social media, attesting to their experiences at the concert. Concert goers were speculating as to what caused this many to die and be sent to the hospital. Some even stated that someone was going around the venue, injecting attendees with various drugs.

In a press conference Saturday, Nov. 6, the Houston police chief Troy Finner spoke out about the rumors being spread about the incident.

"I will tell you, one of the narratives was that some individual was injecting other people with drugs," said Finner. "We do have a report of a security officer, according to the medical staff, that was out and treated last night. He was reaching over to restrain or grab a citizen and he felt a prick in his neck. When he was examined, he went unconscious. They administered Narcan. He was revived. The medical staff did notice there was a prick

The attendees who have spoken out about the incident have also mentioned overcrowding. This is where mass amounts of people will gather in a spot, causing no space for air or space to move around in. Those who are short in nature had more trouble breathing than those individuals who were much taller.

The overcrowding incident was encouraged by performing artist Travis Scott. Scott has been arrested twice in the past for inciting a riot and disorderly conduct. Scott encourages and expects this behavior of his fans.

At the most recent Astroworld concert, it began with a crowd of people trampling a barrier while trying to get into the concert venue. This behavior began to be encouraged by Scott in 2015 at the earliest. The first arrest was made after Lollapalooza, a concert series based out of Chicago. This was the first incident where Scott was arrested for disorderly conduct.

Scott encouraged his fans to rush the stage, trample security and break barriers at his 2015 Lollapalooza concert event. The second arrest was made in 2017 after Scott performed at the Birdseye View

Tour in Rogers, Arkansas. While many attendees were passing out, Scott only took note of one person rather than the mass amount that was affected. The videos show attendees screaming for help. Two men who are assumed to work for Scott walked on stage and told him that there has been a mass casualty, the concert needs to stop. Scott waved them off stage and told the crowd "You know what you came here to do. Let's rage."

A group of people banded together to chant "stop the show!" repeatedly; these chants were ignored by Scott. Travis Scott is seen doing the robot dance on top of a podium while there are handfuls of ambulances in the crowd. Attendees saw these ambulances as an opportunity to dance on the roofs of the ambulances while the EMTs were resuscitating unconscious attendees.

This event was tragic. Many lost their lives to poor event planning, poor concert etiquette and a rapper who did not take the chance to consider his fans' wellbeing. This concert was extremely traumatic to attendees. Testimonials on social media are proving the point; Scott did not and was not truly and purely interested in the well being of his fans.

FALL 2021 COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY

Life is slowly returning to normal just in time for the fall 2021 graduation to begin. The Fall 2021 Commencement Ceremony will be held at the UWG Coliseum on Saturday, Dec. 11. Each ceremony will also be live-streamed and recorded for viewing afterwards.

There will be two ceremonies and each student will be assigned based on their college. At 9:00 a.m. the College of Arts, Culture and Scientific Inquiry and Richards College of Business ceremony will begin. At 1:00 p.m. the College of Education; School of Communication, Film, and Media; Tanner Health System School of Nursing; and University College ceremony will begin.

Due to COVID-19 there are physical distancing guidelines that are in place. There will be no student processional and each student will be seated as they arrive. According to the CDC recommendations, fully vaccinated students or guests don't need to wear a mask or physically distance themselves from others. Unvaccinated students or guests are strongly recommended to get vaccinated, continue to wear a mask and physical distance themselves from others.

Graduation ceremonies will continue normally but if any students wish to refrain from shaking hands, students are told to place their hand over their heart so the President, Provost and Dean will know to refrain from giving a handshake or simply offer a fist bump.

Tickets will not be given out that are required for entrance, all the seating will be general admission.

Students that are graduating should have their cap and gown orders placed early so they arrive on time. All graduating candidates will have royal blue tassels which is a new addition that UWG is doing for fall 2021.

Any student who qualifies for honor stoles will receive an email from the UWG Graduation Team letting them know. The honor stoles may be purchased directly from the UWG Bookstore.

Students marching in the ceremony need to arrive at least 45 minutes early dressed in regalia, ready to participate. Late arrivals may not be permitted to participate.



WHAT IS THE IRB? THE ETHICS OF **PERFORMING** RESEARCH WITH HUMAN **PARTICIPANTS**

At the University of West Georgia, the Institutional Review Board (IRB) is the committee responsible for reviewing research proposals and ensuring that any study on campus is complying with ethical considerations. For UWG students that are currently involved in research, the process of doing research with human participants involves planning and care to ensure that ethical boundaries are not crossed. Researchers looking to perform any study on campus involving people must contact IRB.

Christine Simmonds-Moore, Professor of Psychology at UWG, said that human participants should be valued and respected in any research study.

"People are freely giving their time to volunteer and participate in research," said Simmonds-Moore. "It is really important to work with a faculty advisor if you are doing student research and learning about | in completing and submitting IRB | you

reviewed by the IRB who ensure that the research has overall value and that there are more benefits for the person/society/knowledge than there are potential problems." here are many potential eth-

ical concerns about using people in studies, even if it is just a simple research survey. The goal is to protect participants' privacy, fully inform them of what to expect in the study and prevent additional harm.

"Human participants should be fully informed with regard to what to expect if they choose to opt in to take part in a study [for interviews and experiments as well as surveys]," said Simmonds-Moore. "In general, people taking part in research should not experience additional harm or distress by taking part and they should have the right to withdraw from the study at any time [even in a survey - for example, it may be upsetting or triggering for people who have experienced personal trauma to answer questions about that trauma in a survey and this includes removing their data after they have taken part in a study."

If students are performing this type of research and need to contact the IRB, working with a faculty advisor, either as an independent study or as part of a thesis or dissertation, will help to coordinate the process, according to Simmonds-Moore.

ethics. Research at UWG should be applications. All students and faculty who are involved in the project must take special ethics training to submit an IRB application. This is housed on the UWG ORSP site and is called CITI training.

Once the IRB receives the application, they will evaluate the contents of the research study and decide whether it was designed effectively.

"I do not sit on the IRB but from my experience as a researcher the IRB are checking that the researchers have thought about the research from the perspective of the potential participants and not just about their goal of finding out information from the participants," said Simmonds-Moore. "It is often the case that when you submit an IRB you get some initial feedback in terms of clarifying language, asking to see all materials that would be used in the study and making sure that all participants are being fully informed and being asked to sign a consent form, or other ways of giving consent, prior to taking part."

There is an array of research opportunities available to students on campus, whether it be through the honors college or independent research and faculty is encouraging students to get involved.

"Research is fun," Simmonds-Moore. "It is a great way for you to contribute to the growing knowledge base. Try to Faculty members will assist students get involved in research where see opportunities arising."

UWG undergraduate student and independent music artist Jay Pruitt recently released a new song "A Bit Insane" on Apple Music and Spotify. While Pruitt is a non-traditional student looking into anthropological studies, he recently began a fruitful music endeavor online, including his music being broadcasted on Wolf Radio.

"I wrote it to get out of a bit of frustration that I was having being locked in quarantine," says Pruitt. "[From] being quarantined with somebody and the conflict that can arise from it. But I wanted to show more than tell instead of just saying it."

Pruitt began as an online music artist in May covering Lewis Capaldi's "Days Gone Quiet" which remains his most popular song, covering 62% of his streams on Spotify. His cover charted him as the number one indie artist in Australia and Russia.

In June, Pruitt posted his first original "The Truth" to Spotify and Apple, featuring the vocal talents of his mother Doris Tucker.

With his second single "Silent Man" released in August, Pruitt shifted from ballad style to upbeat, synthpop. "Silent Man" surpassed his previous release in stream count and allowed Pruitt to feature as a trending indie artist for an extended amount of time.

Pruitt's latest single "A Bit Insane"

continues the fast paced stride of "Silent Man" but incorporates a more punk sound instead of synth-pop. The song has under a thousand streams on Spotify but soared on Apple Music with 23k streams.

Since the release of his first Pruitt's music has exceeded over 100k streams on Apple Music and 37k streams on Spotify.

About a week after "A Bit Insane" debuted, Wolf Radio requested the audio to play on their program. "[Wolf Radio] knew

One important figure in his growth as an artist and writer includes Dr. Gregory Fraser from UWG's English Department. Pruitt attended Fraser's "Intro to Creative Writing" class this semester and credits Fraser for

sharpening his poetry and songwriting. "I did not know that I could write poetry before taking [Intro to Creative Writing] even though I knew I could write

me," says Pruitt. "I recommend every sin-

Despite anxieties, Pruitt still pushes himself to create music and put his work out into the world. Similarly, many students everywhere, including UWG, share their creations including music, art and other talents with the world but there are also some who hesitate to publish their own works for one reason or another. UWG offers a platform for not just learning but provides a platform for students to share their talents, passions and projects. While today's online landscape especially can be overwhelming, Pruitt and many other small creators still need to start somewhere.

"When it comes to writing music, an easy way to start is to take a song you already like and try rewriting the lyrics. Then try rewriting the melody and then from there, try making a new instrumental from it," says Pruitt. "And don't be afraid to ask people for help."

For music artists not knowing where to start, Pruitt recommends playing around with different apps like Reaktor or the free program Audacity.

In the future, Pruitt hopes to perform his music in front of a live audience and will continue releasing unique songs in the meantime.
