UWG Offers Ways to Help Students Deal With the Stress of Upcoming Finals

UWG works hard to provide opportunities for students to take a break and de-stress during finals week. Helpful tools like tutoring and study supplies are available along with relaxation tools like massage therapy and late night breakfast. On Dec. 2, UWG's University Recreation offered a Finals Flow Yoga Night session for students to take a breather and relocate their stress to a healthier outlet.

Brae Mooney, a UWG student preparing for finals attended the session to help her relieve stress from the week.

"I really felt like I was able to de-stress from finals and focus on something else for a little bit," said Mooney.

The session went from 6 to 8 p.m. and helped about 20 students relax and recharge. The class started with an icebreaker where students were able to introduce themselves by sharing what exams they had coming up in an attempt to release stress vocally before starting the session.

"There were a lot of breathing and stretching exercises," said Mooney. "The class was mainly focused on calming and grounding techniques.

The University Recreation offers yoga year round with weekly beginner level yoga classes and also special events like this one. In the past students have attended events like Candlelight Yoga and Glow in the Dark Yoga but this one was planned specifically to use techniques to deal with stress. Even the music played during the session was meant to create a stress free sensation.

"There was a good mix of mediation music and chill

R&B, which I really liked, that made it a very calming atmosphere," said Mooney.

No matter the difficulty level, yoga has proven to have positive emotional benefits. It releases dopamine and serotonin and is shown to improve energy and positivity. Despite their slow moving and controlled movements, yoga also increases heart rate giving physical benefits as well as emotional. Following proper yoga techniques can show results similar to ones medications can give, and oftentimes is a much more healthy outlet than market medications.

One of the most helpful techniques used during the session was a breathing exercise done with a candle that focused on dealing with stress through a healthier outlet.

"The instructor brought little artificial candles for us to hold when we did meditation to make it

feel like we were sparing our mentality towards finals into the candle instead of exams while taking deep breaths," said Mooney.

Jean Dawson's Glimmer of God: An Indie Triumph

Jean Dawson is a rising star in the experimental pop scene. His past two studio albums, 2020's Pixel Bath and 2022's CHAOS NOW*, have painted him as a singer songwriter who isn't afraid to break genre conventions and branch out into bold musical directions. Dawson's striking mix of pop, rap and brash punk rock has earned him a dedicated cult following and the chance to tour across the world with major artists like Brockhampton.

Following his recent breakout successes, Dawson released his third studio album this October, a 15 track project called 'Glimmer of God.

Being teased all the way back in Nov. 2023, the record serves as a bit of a shakeup for his longtime fans. On top of featuring the rap rock fusion they're accustomed to, Dawson experiments further into a cornucopia of varied genres, each song having its

own distinct feel, tone and sound. The

musical variation is so great that you could be mistaken for thinking that the tracks were created by different artists entirely, let alone all be in the same album.

While to some this may seem unfocused, the fact that it all fits together so well is a testament to the flexibility and talent of Dawson.

Right out of the gate, you're hit with "Darlin'," a heartfelt and melancholic track about the nature of devotion with Dawson's particular flair. Its nature as the album's opener paints the rest of it as a more subversive, introspective piece that contrasts his past bombastic releases.

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The momentum is carried with standout songs like "Houston," a track that uses a more retro synth type soundscape that would make fans of The Weeknd feel right at home. Its uplifting, catchy chorus and spacy

instrumentation make it the perfect

track to roll your windows down and cruise to.

The pacing of Glimmer of God seemingly never misses a beat, its sheer variety making every new song feel like a fresh new experience to the ears. Right after the bass heavy rap track "Slow Heavy Ecstasy," Dawson hits you with the beautiful and delicate "The Boy and The Swan." Its inclusion following the previous song almost feels like a mid-album palette cleanser, one that expands upon his previous acoustic work with what sounds like a full orchestra.

As a long time fan of Dawson's work, the amount of high profile features in the record was a welcome surprise. Each feature effortlessly fit the vibe that the given song was going for. Standouts include Lil Yachty's verse in "Die For Me," and the Bones feature in "P4IN." The track being a tribute to the cloud rap scene, it felt more than fitting to include an artist that helped popularize it in the first place.

While it's important to note that not all of the musical experimentation in the album is necessarily a breakout success, it's made up for with the overwhelming creativity and boldness on display. Glimmer of God no doubt marks a major turning point in the up and coming artist's career, and a piece that I'd consider emblematic of his potential as a singer songwriter.

Indie Pop Band Boyscott Releases Sophomore Album After Nine Years of Silence

After almost ten years, Nashville-based indie pop band **Boyscott** released highly Spellbound, its anticipated sophomore album, on Oct. 16. The new album features 10 new songs filled with bedroom pop melodies reflecting the soothing sounds of ocean waves and road trips with old friends.

Boyscott, the indie project fronted by singer and guitarist Scott Hermo, has steadily built a devoted following, amassing over 70 million streams of its debut album, Goose Bumps. Hermo wrote and produced this record during his time in college at Belmont University in Nashville, Tenn., in 2015, starting what would become Boyscott. His music blends the introspective aspects of alternative icons like Modest Mouse, Death Cab for Cutie, and Vampire Weekend with a fresh, breezy twist. By incorporating smooth, mellow riffs and sun-kissed melodies, Boyscott has crafted effortlessly captivating sound that combines indie rock with a laid-back, beachy pop vibe.

Since its start almost ten years ago, Hermo has since recruited guitarist and backup singer Emma Willer, bassist Davey Alaimo, and drummer Noah Dardaris. Together, they established a pop four-piece band and have steadily toured the United States and parts of Canada to sustain the growth of the band.

Boyscott's sophomore album Spellbound builds on the breezy, beachy vibes of its debut, but the addition of a full

band elevates the experience far beyond expectations. The record opens powerfully with "Rocky Road," setting the tone with Hermo's mellow yet captivating guitar riffa perfect introduction to the journey that Spellbound takes its listeners on. Willer's backing vocals add depth and emotion, creating a rich, layered sound that was missing in Goose Bumps. The chemistry among the band members is undeniable; all four artists come together effortlessly to craft a seamless beach-pop anthem that captures the essence of the album.

The lyrics of "Rocky Road" capture the band's journey of pursuing a career in music, reflecting on the waves of emotions they experienced during their first ever tour together. Hermo's heartfelt vocals delve into the fear and excitement of trusting your instincts and stepping into the unknown. This track is the perfect opener for the album, serving as an ode to the band's beginnings and their evolution over the years. Through themes of friendship, struggle, and adventure, "Rocky Road" beautifully celebrates what sparked Boyscott's formation and marks their triumphant return after nine long years.

As the album progresses, Boyscott deepens its signature indie-pop vibe, delivering a collection of tracks that worthy of repeating. is tailor-made Spellbound for a spot on any summer hits playlist, with its sunny melodies and infectious energy.

Although released in the fall, this record has all the makings of a sleeper hit, destined to gain momentum and become a summer staple by the time the warmer months roll around.

The sixth track on the record. "After Dark," stands out as the most influential song on the new release. Its lyrics beautifully narrate the story of two people meeting in a park at night, gazing at the sky, and savoring the moment, not wanting to part ways. Hermo's voice and guitar picking complement the storytelling flawlessly, creating an introspective atmosphere that adds layers of emotion to the already moving narrative. The melody's reflective tone deepens the song's impact, making it a standout moment on the album. Positioned perfectly at the midpoint of the album, "After Dark" provides a soothing interlude between the other more upbeat tracks. I believe this song has the potential to become the band's biggest hit, resonating deeply with listeners and leaving a lasting impression.

The album's closing track, "Orca," serves as a fitting end. At just 49 seconds, this instrumental piece delivers a breezy, beach-pop guitar riff that's undeniably captivating. Its effortless tone left me longing for more, as I couldn't help but imagine how the addition of Hermo's vocals and lyrics could have elevated the track even further. The band had the opportunity to expand on this beautiful foundation of a song, potentially creating something truly remarkable.

Despite its brevity, "Orca" is a short but sweet conclusion to the long-awaited album. It feels like a subtile hint of what's to come, leaving listeners eager for the band's future works.

Overall, Boyscott's longawaited return has far exceeded my expectations. Given the nine-year gap since their 2015 debut album, Goose Bumps, I wondered if their new release could measure up to such a beloved classic. Bands often undergo significant changes over time- whether in lyrics, genre, or lineup- making it difficult to predict what to expect. However, I was pleasantly surprised to find that Hermo has effortlessly preserved the essence of summer and beachside nostalgia in his music. With Spellbound, **Boyscott** has delivered a timeless and deeply influential album—a remarkable feat that few artists achieve after such a long hiatus.

I believe Spellbound will go down in music history. It's not every day that a band can remain inactive for years and still make such an impact with a new release. I was truly blown away by the soothing indiepop grooves, which the band blended together effortlessly. From the first track to the last, there wasn't a single song worth skipping. Spellbound marks a major milestone for Boyscott, and I'm hopeful it will propel the band forward, inspiring them to continue writing, recording, and sharing new music with the world.
